

MINUTES OF A MEETING
OF THE
ALABAMA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

HELD Tuesday, January 6, 2026

The January 2026 meeting of the Alabama Public Service Commission was held on Tuesday, January 6, 2026, in the Carl L. Evans Chief Administrative Law Judge Hearing Room Complex, 100 North Union Street, Montgomery, Alabama. Commission President Cynthia Lee Almond called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. with Commissioner Jeremy H. Oden and Commissioner Chris V. Beeker, III, present. 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Commissioner Almond noted that the public was informed of today's Commission meeting by notice dated November 7, 2025.

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Commissioner Almond opened the meeting with a prayer and led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

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Commissioner Almond opened the floor for a motion to approve the minutes of the December 2, 2025, Commission Meeting.

Upon being motioned by Commissioner Oden and seconded by Commissioner Beeker, the Commissioners voted unanimously to approve the minutes.

UTILITY SERVICES DIVISION

Mr. Jeff Johnston reported for the Utility Services Division on Consumer Service Complaint Inquiries for the period of December 2025 as follows: Alabama Power Company had twenty residential and one business inquiry, Spire Alabama had fourteen residential inquiries and zero business inquiries, and Spire Gulf had one residential and zero business inquiries. There was a total of five telecommunication inquiries, consisting of zero under Public Service Commission Complaint jurisdiction, two were referred to the companies since the complaint jurisdiction was waived, and three were not under Public Service Commission jurisdiction.

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Mr. Johnston reported on Formal Dockets 18046 and 18328, Spire Alabama Inc., Division Report on Rate RSE as of November 30, 2025. Mr. Johnston reported on Rate RSE for Spire Alabama Inc., based on preliminary figures as of November 30, 2025, the projected RSE return on average common equity for the rate year ending September 30, 2026, was 9.71 percent. The authorized return on average common equity is 9.50 to 9.90 percent.

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Mr. Johnston reported on Formal Docket 28101, Spire Gulf Inc., Division Report on Rate RSE as of November 30, 2025. Based on preliminary figures as of November 30, 2025, the projected RSE return on average common equity for the rate year ending September 30, 2026, was 9.44 percent. The authorized return on average common equity is 9.70 to 10.30 percent.

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Mr. Johnston reported on Docket 26429, St. Joe Communications, Inc. D/B/A Consolidated Communications Long Distance for approval to add two (2) DBAs to the Company name: Consolidated Communications - St. Joe and Fidium - St. Joe and recommended approval.

Upon motion by Commissioner Oden and seconded by Commissioner Beeker, the Commissioners voted unanimously to accept the recommendation for approval.

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Mr. Johnston noted final items were for information purposes only and require no action by the Commissioners.

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GAS PIPELINE SAFETY DIVISION

Mr. Jonathan Kimbril reported for the Gas Pipeline Safety (GPS) Division Agenda on the following inspections during the month of November 2025.

Inspections

During the month of November, a total of fifty (50) inspections were conducted utilizing seventy-six (76) in person-days. The inspections are as follows:

Enforcement Actions

From the fifty (50) inspections shown above, three (3) enforcement letters of notification were issued leading to seven (7) non-compliance items. There were eleven (11) non-compliance items corrected during the month of November.

Incidents/Accidents

There was one (1) state reportable incident, and zero (0) federal incidents reported during the month November.

➤ 11/15/2025 Florence Gas Department - While installing a new valve, the operator identified that the valve selected was not appropriate for the intended operation. Florence Gas reduced pipeline pressure and replaced the valve with the correct valve for the application. No customer service was lost, and the operator took prompt corrective action to address the issue. No Alabama 811 locate ticket was required, as all work was performed above ground.

Miscellaneous

The Gas Pipeline Safety (GPS) Division has no items to present for miscellaneous in November.

The National Response Center (NRC) reported three incidents in November:

1. A log truck strike with unknown injuries in Greenville on CSX.
2. A vehicle strike with a fatal injury in Montgomery County on CSX.
3. A dimethylamine anhydrous vapor release in Mobile on CSX.

There were also two accidents and complaints reported via telephone or email in November.

1. A rough crossing complaint was reported in Dolomite.
2. A single car yard derailment with no injuries or releases in Birmingham on BNSF.

The rough crossing complaint was investigated and substantiated by RWS staff. Staff met with railroad officials to discuss the rough highway grade crossing condition and to seek a resolution. The rail carrier informed us of their intention to make repairs to the crossing, and a follow-up inspection was scheduled.

Motor Carrier Services

The Motor Carrier Services (MCS) staff accomplished the following matters regarding state authority to operate as a motor carrier in Alabama with proof of insurance coverage:

As of November 30th, there were 9,106 Alabama carriers (94%) registered for the 2025 UCR, with 578 remaining unregistered.

As of November 30th, there were 3,519 Alabama carriers (42%) registered for the 2026 UCR, leaving 4,770 unregistered. Our office received funds from the UCR Depository for October online payments processed through the National Registration System (NRS) from 2,988 carriers domiciled in Alabama and non-participating states.

The staff also assisted motor carriers in making necessary changes to their operating status with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA). Three MCS-150 forms were processed. One motor carrier had its USDOT number deactivated, and two forms contained updates to the motor carriers' USDOT number data.

MCS staff participated in the UCR Industry Advisory Subcommittee call during the month.

There were three For Non-Profit (FNP) quarterly reports for the third quarter of 2025 received during the month.

In November, a passenger tariff for Reliable Rides Caring Service, LLC (C4188), a passenger tariff for Gary Johnson dba TransitExpress/EasyRyde Alabama (C4192), a taxi tariff for Jersey Taxi, LLC (C4189), and a household goods tariff for Rivers Ridge Moving and Labor LLC dba Rivers Ridge Moving and Labor (NEW) were received and accepted. Also, one household goods tariff was rejected for Logan Martin Moving and Delivery, LLC (NEW).

During the month, a passenger carrier audit was completed for Hillard Wright dba Kings Airport Shuttle Service (C3971). It was

recommended that the carrier update its current tariff on file with the Commission and abide by the geographical scope in its tariff. Additionally, a passenger carrier audit for Montgomery Tours LLC dba Montgomery Tours (C4098) was completed. It was recommended that the carrier update its current tariff on file to increase its rates with the Commission and abide by the geographical scope in its tariff.

ELECTRICITY POLICY DIVISION

Mrs. Patricia Smith reported on Alabama Power Company's Weighted Return on Average Retail Common Equity Calculation for the 12 Months Ended December 31, 2025.

Mrs. Smith reported on Formal Dockets 18117 and 18416; 18148 Division Report on Rate RSE and Rate ECR as of November 30, 2025. The Electricity Policy Division performed the regular monthly examination of the books and records of Alabama Power Company and found a 6.49% Weighted Return on Average Retail Common Equity for the 12 months ending December 31, 2025, and Energy Cost Under recovered by \$13,189,620 for November 2025.

DOCKET 33652, Application of Logan Martin Moving and Delivery, LLC, of Talladega, Alabama for a certificate to transport household goods and recommended approval of certificate and tariff,

DOCKET 33644, Application of Rivers Ridge Moving and Labor LLC d/b/a Rivers Ridge Moving and Labor, of Decatur, Alabama, for a certificate to transport household goods and recommended approval of certificate and tariff,

DOCKET C-21366, Petition of Angelo Hauling LLC, of Pinson, Alabama, for reinstatement of Motor Carrier Certificate F5223 which was revoked due to Petitioner's failure to maintain proper proof of cargo insurance. Petitioner submitted documentation that showed their cargo insurance coverage required by law is now in effect and recommended reinstatement,

DOCKET C-21323, Petition of John Alan Carr d/b/a Carr Trucking, of Fyffe, Alabama for reinstatement of Motor Carrier Certificate F2203 which was revoked due to Petitioner's failure to maintain proper proof of cargo insurance. Petitioner submitted

documentation that showed their cargo insurance coverage required by law is now in effect and recommended reinstatement.

DOCKET C-21353, Petition of Flowerwood Management Inc. d/b/a Flowerwood Trucking, of Loxley, Alabama for reinstatement of Motor Carrier Certificate F1919 which was revoked due to Petitioner's failure to maintain proper proof of cargo insurance. Petitioner submitted documentation that showed their cargo insurance coverage required by law is now in effect and recommended reinstatement.

DOCKET C-21305, Petition of Veloxly Careride Inc., of Jasper, Alabama for reinstatement of Motor Carrier Certificate FNP B-141 wich was revoked due to Petitioner's failure to maintain proper proof of liability insurance coverage. Petitioner submitted documentation that showed their liability insurance coverage required by law is now in effect and recommended reinstatement.

DOCKET 33599, Motor Carrier Certificate 4187 was issued to James Keith Howell d/b/a J&G Taxi, of Daphne, Alabama, by Commission Order dated September 10, 2025. Said Order also required James Keith Howell d/b/a J&G Taxi to file its tariff and liability insurance. James Keith Howell d/b/a J&G Taxi has failed to make the required filing and recommended cancellation on 30 days' notice.

Upon motion by Commissioner Beeker and seconded by Commissioner Oden, the Commissioners voted unanimously to accept the recommendations.

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
Judge Garner recommended approval of all items listed on the administrative agenda.
